VOTE BY MAIL IN **FOUR** EASY STEPS



1. REQUEST

Any registered and qualified voter who is eligible to vote in an election may cast their vote by vote-by-mail ballot. An vote-by-mail ballot may be requested for a specific election or for all elections through the next two regularly scheduled general elections. The request can be made in person, by postal mail, by electronic mail or by telephone. Only the voter or designated member of his or her immediate family or legal guardian can request an vote-by-mail ballot for the voter. The request deadline is always the Wednesday prior to the Election.



2. VOTE

The voter must personally vote their ballot. Vote-by-mail ballots are mailed 35 days prior to each election to those voters who have requested an vote-by-mail ballot. Be sure the Elections Office has your correct mailing address. Vote-by-mail ballots are not forwarded by the US Postal Service. Vote-by-mail ballots for overseas military and overseas civilian voters are mailed 45 days prior to an election.



3. SIGN

The voter must sign the return envelope. Power of attorney is not recognized for vote-by-mail voting in the state of Florida. The vote-by-mail ballot will not be counted if the return envelope is not signed or if the signature does not match the signature we have in the voter registration file. An unsigned vote-by-mail ballot may be presented to the Canvassing Board for a decision if this affidavit is received before 5:00 p.m. on the Monday prior to Election Day: http://www.flaglerelections.com/Portals/Flagler/pdfs/DS-DE_139.pdf



4. DELIVER

You must mail, personally deliver or have someone else deliver your vote-by-mail ballot inside the completed mailing envelope to the Elections Office. Sufficient postage is required if mailed. Vote-by-mail ballots must be received no later than 7:00 P.M. on the day of the election. Vote-by-mail ballots cannot be turned in at the polling place on Election Day unless the voter himself wishes to vote in person at the polls. If a voter has requested an vote-by-mail ballot and chooses to vote in person at the polls, the vote-by-mail ballot is cancelled and the voter is issued a new ballot.

MAILING ADDRESS REQUIRED!

Florida Statutes

Request for vote-by-mail ballots 101.62 (1)(b):

The supervisor may accept a written or telephonic request for an vote-by-mail ballot to be mailed to an elector's address on file in the Florida Voter Registration System from the elector, or, if directly instructed by the elector, a member of the elector's immediate family, or the elector's legal guardian; if the ballot is requested to be mailed to an address other than the elector's address on file in the Florida Voter Registration System, the request must be made in writing and signed by the elector. However, an absent uniformed service voter or an overseas voter seeking an vote-by-mail ballot is not required to submit a signed, written request for an vote-by-mail ballot that is being mailed to an address other than the elector's address on file in the Florida Voter Registration System.

Florida law requires an vote-by-mail ballot request to an address *other than* the elector's address on file, must be submitted in **WRITING** and **SIGNED** by the voter. Please print, complete and return the form below to request an vote-by-mail ballot.

VOTE BY MAIL

REMEMBER: Power Of Attorney is not recognized for mail voting in the state of Florida.

VOTING BY MAIL BALLOT

Any registered voter may vote by mail. A mail ballot may be requested for a specific election or for all elections through the next two regularly scheduled general elections. The request can be made in person, by telephone, by mail or by using the online form (visit www.FlaglerElections.com). Requested ballots are mailed approximately three weeks before an election. Later requests are mailed as they are received. Only the voter or a designated member of his or her immediate family or legal guardian can request a ballot for the voter. Immediate family means the voter's spouse or the parent, child, grandparent, or sibling of the voter or of the voter's spouse. Mail ballots are not forwarded by the U.S. Postal Service so please provide your mailing address at the time of the request.

A MAIL BALLOT IS NOT A SAMPLE BALLOT

Each household is mailed a sample ballot prior to each election, which can be used for reference at the polling place. A mail ballot is not a sample ballot. If you have requested a mail ballot and decide to vote in person, bring your mail ballot with you to the polling place. The election poll workers at the polling place will cancel your mail ballot and issue you a new ballot to vote at the polls.

VOTING & RETURNING A MAIL BALLOT

The voter must personally vote the ballot (unless assistance is required due to blindness or disability) AND sign the return envelope. An Elections Office drop box is available at the entrance of our office for after hours drop off. Mail ballots must be returned by mail or hand-delivered so that they reach the Elections Office by 7:00 P.M. on the day of the election.

PRECINCT 08

FLAGLER EXECUTIVE AIRPORT
(New Precinct, was Pct 10 - Flagler County Schools Building)

Why?
A new precinct was created to accommodate future growth.

Areas affected:
Seminole Woods (S-Section, U-Section) and Integra Woods Apartments.

PRECINCT 09

FLAGLER COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF REALTORS BUILDING
(Polling site changed from First Baptist Church of Bunnell)

Why?
Entire precinct. Previous location did not renew contract as a polling site.

Areas affected:
Entire precinct includes Quail Hollow (K-Section, Z-Section).

PRECINCT 10

FLAGLER COUNTY SCHOOLS BUILDING
(Voters moved from Pct 09 - Previously the First Baptist Church of Bunnell)

Why?
Precinct boundary adjusted to accommodate future growth in Town Center.

Areas affected:
Cypress Knoll (E-Section) and Town Center.

PRECINCT 13

AFRICAN AMERICAN CULTURAL SOCIETY
(Polling site changed from Christ The King Lutheran Church)

Why?
Previous location did not renew contract as a polling site.

Areas affected:
Entire precinct includes WNW portions of R-Section and portions of W-Section.

Two new precincts were created in our county to accommodate areas of growth. Several other voting locations were adjusted, which shifted voters from very heavily populated areas to neighboring precincts. It is expected that these changes will be sufficient as we grow through the 2020 election cycle.

PRECINCT 14

PALM COAST BIBLE CHURCH
(Voters moved from Pct 18 - Shepherd of the Coast Lutheran Church)

Why?
Precinct adjusted to balance voter density among neighboring precincts.

Areas affected:
All streets and voters off Wynnfield Drive.

PRECINCT 24

MATANZAS HIGH SCHOOL
(Voters moved from Pct 23 - VFW Post #8696)

Why?
A new precinct was created to balance voter density in Flagler County's largest precinct. Allows for growth along N. Old Kings Road.

Areas affected:
F-Section from Farnum Lane north on Old Kings. F-Section north from Farmsworth Drive north on Palm Harbor Parkway. Includes all streets in this area between I-95 and the Intracoastal Waterway to the county line.

PRECINCT 20

PARKVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH
(Voters moved from Pct 21 - Belle Terre Elementary School)

Why?
Precinct boundary adjusted to accommodate future growth in Palm Coast Park Community Development District.

Areas affected:
B-Section area including streets and voters off Bird of Paradise Drive and also Burroughs Drive.
